



Born on March 5, 1982, in Southbridge, New Zealand, Dan Carter is a rugby legend whose journey from a small town in the South Island to becoming one of the greatest fly-halves in the history of rugby.

Carter's love for rugby ignited during his childhood. His talent was evident early on, and by his teenage years, he had already made a name for himself as a rising star.

In 2003, Carter made his debut for the All Blacks, marking the beginning of a spectacular international career. Known for his remarkable playmaking ability, dazzling footwork, and a lethal kicking game, Carter became the star of the New Zealand rugby team.

The pinnacle of Carter's career came during the 2015 Rugby World Cup. Despite facing challenges with injuries earlier in the tournament, he delivered a masterclass performance in the final against Australia, securing the Webb Ellis Cup for New Zealand.

Carter is the only player in rugby history to have scored more than fifteen hundred points for his country. His total of one thousand, five hundred and ninety eight is three hundred and fifty two more than second place, Jonny Wilkinson.

After he retired, Carter transitioned seamlessly into various roles, including coaching and commentary, ensuring that his wealth of knowledge continues to contribute to the world of rugby.
